Tasks	Details	Worth
Task one	Critical thinking on Information Sources	
	The purpose of this task is to help you become familiar with referencing, researching and being aware of the need to be critical in your writing.  There is a good document on Moodle called 'Critical thinking, So what does that really mean?' which you should read before you start this task.  1. Choose a written assignment you need to complete over the next few weeks or have recently completed [if you are exempt from the modules that require a written assignment you may use any other piece of research you need to carry out or answer the questions below saying what you would do].  2. Watch the video on Moodle prepared by Robert, our librarian, on how to assess research sources. I have also brought together some fact sheets, which are included in the folder below the video, which you might dip into.  3. Then, write 400 words on the process you used to	12%
	find and select information sources for your college	

work. Your writing should be reflective and justify why what you say is good practice. For example, if you say "The first thing I do when I locate a book from the library is look at the date the book was originally written and the date of any updates" you then need to explain why this is important.

Read the hand-out on reflective writing which has a nice piece at the back which leads you through the reflective writing process. I have uploaded this again in the folder below.

Your submission should include:

- How you set about locating appropriate sources once you know an assessment title
- How you know an author is knowledgeable
- How you know information is reliable
- How you cite sources in college work
- Possible issues a source may have {example out of date etc}
- Give examples to back up these points.

  The list above is **not** a series of headings but merely prompts to help you, draft your work and then plan to revisit it many times to improve it. This is not possible to do if you start the work the night before submission! By writing and going away and thinking about the task you begin to improve your writing style and your work.

#### Task Two

### Team Work

This task looks at teamwork and the positions people often assume within teams. When doing this task, you may consider any teamwork you have been involved in, be it a team assessment in college/work, tutorial teamwork, or study groups.

- 1. Complete the Belbin Questionnaire and read the information concerning the different team roles.
- 2. Write a reflective piece on the type of team player this questionnaire suggests you are. Comment on whether you agree with these results [always give evidence via examples to backup your points], discuss how you can use the

Three	Inspiring Talks or Articles and	
	presentation	
	This will be held in class on the last two weeks of term. Time a date for each student will be given in class.	
	This part of the assessment for ELD will improve your presentation skills while also allowing you to learn about various aspects of computing science from each other.  I want you to think of an area of computing science	
	that holds a particular interest to you. Something that	
	inspires you, that you are genuinely interested in. This	
	could be an inspiring person in the area or an aspect of	
	the computing domain that you may wish to pursue as	
	a career or an area of your studies that you are not	
	covering in class yet but you find interesting.	
	1. Find an article, video, presentation, journal paper or	
	any other form of information which relates to the	25%
	topic you wish to discuss.	
	2. Add the video link or academic reference/ PDF to	
	the Moodle forum which I have already started [This	
	will allow me to read the article in advance of your	
	presentation]	
	4. Once you have found the video or article you	
	wish to discuss, prepare a maximum of 5 power	
	point slides which you will present to the class.	
	The length of presentation should be 5 minutes so	
	put lots of thought into what you say. Given the	
	small number of slides you need to really think	
	about what you want to say so that the essence of	
	your points come across. Please read the handout	
	on critical writing which is on Moodle before you	
	begin, you will not receive a good mark if you	
	only describe the item, you need to critically	
	only describe the item, you need to critically	

analyse it.....this means you need to provide your own insight into whether you agree or disagree using valid arguments to support what you are saying. The article in critical writing will help you.

Be aware as always that the videos and your comments will be viewed by your classmates so do not post anything which may be offensive to anyone.

For this assignment you need to upload **ONE word document**. Students find it easier to download the coversheet from Moodle and then add the assignment to it.
