Instructions: Please answer the prompt question(s) in essay form. Your paper must contain clear and concise analysis and be ***at least*** three pages in length (no more than five), double-spaced, with one-inch margins and twelve-point font. Prompt Question (due Saturday, June 26, 2021):

In your paper, discuss how author Elaine Weiss uses the narrative style to tell the story of the quest for women's suffrage in the United States. Who does she identify as the primary characters in this historical story? In what ways did inter-movement conflicts, political opportunism, and strong personalities influence the fight for (and eventual passage of) the 19th amendment to the Constitution? Do you feel the author's narrative style strengthened or hindered the central arguments of the book?
