Assessment Task 2: Research Essay (40%)

Due Date: 25th August

This assignment asks you to embark on a journey of becoming a teacher who leads the way in embedding Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander perspectives in your curriculum.

- The Task:** This is a traditional 2000-word research essay with references. You have a choice of one of three topics:
1. What philosophies and principles do teachers need to consider when planning, implementing and evaluating teaching and learning experiences around Indigenous perspectives in the classroom?
 2. How does colonisation continue to impact on the education of Indigenous students and how does the provision of a culturally safe classroom help address such a legacy?
 3. How have the voices of Indigenous people driven the inclusion of Indigenous perspectives in the curriculum?

So much has been written over the past thirty (or more) years on how this can be done. Here are some possible places to start, but your tutors will have more ideas and sources as well.

Don't forget – you should be looking for Australian Indigenous sources.
